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Last Meeting - Risdon Vale Primary School Kitchen Garden Program Grow, Harvest, Prepare, Share



Rachael Wells & Peta Burr from Risdon Vale Primary School gave a presentation to a very well attended Club meeting on their 24 Carrot Kitchen Garden Program.

The school is a MONA 24 Carrot Kitchen Garden School associated with the Stephanie Alexander program. Students participate in weekly 'seed to plate' gardening and cooking experiences that are linked to the curriculum and promote health and well-being. The school has a newly-developed "outdoor classroom" which allows them to provide further opportunities for students to engage in meaningful, practical learning beyond the traditional classroom.

They have supplemented the program with an Aboriginal Education Worker, "Aunty Deb", who gives the students an appreciation of aboriginal language & culture, safe & sustainable practices for caring for the land and a respect for the local environment.

The school is keen to try and improve the program by the addition of a greenhouse. This would enable students to cultivate their own seedlings and allow them to grow produce all year round for their cooking program, as well as creating a windbreak to protect the more delicate crops.
