


Last Meeting - Ursula Taylor CEO Derwent Estuary Program

Ursula has been in Tasmania for 19 years and for the last 15 years has worked with the Derwent Estuary Program.

The Derwent Estuary, as defined by the Program, stretches from New Norfolk to the Iron Pot and has been professionally monitored for the last 20 years, making it one of the longest monitoring programs in Australia.

The Program focus is on 4 central themes – managing human pressures, protecting ecosystems, enhancing human uses & promoting understanding, awareness and participation.

Newsletter Update from our President

Great news, its breakout time!! The Rotary Club of Lindisfarne is back to face to face meetings starting next week. A real guest speaker, good company, a cold drink and a great home cooked meal. All the ingredients for a great Rotary Club meeting that we have been missing during the lockdown. We are allowed to have 40 people so let's all try to be there.

I am sending out this message a little earlier than our usual bulletin to give people more time to plan what they want to do. In the interest of their personal health some people might decide not to attend yet which would be understandable if you have been in isolation for three months. Richard and Stephen are working on the technical side of offering Zoom attendance as part of the meeting for those who want to use it. We will let you know how we go as soon as we can.

We had a very busy face to face Board meeting on the 10th June. Way harder to chair than a Zoom meeting. Rotarians can certainly talk when they get back together after such a long break. Some of what was said was important so I have a few things to share.

- The biggest issue is that we have for some time not known who or how many would be attending our meetings and having meals. This is causing our caterer major headaches and we need to do something to improve the situation. This week because it is a fresh start we need everyone to reply yes or no to attending and yes or no to a meal. Into the future we need that information every meeting if we are to be able to guarantee people a meal. I will be talking to John Cole about devising a simple way to do this so that we don't drive Richard mad with endless phone calls. We will trial these changes for three months and do a review. Please help us with this so that we can come up with a workable solution to an age old problem. Payment to the Bowls Club for drinks will be by card but our meals will continue to be \$20 cash. Those choosing not to have a meal will continue to be charged \$5 cash to cover administrative costs. For the moment RCOL will try to avoid using the card machine.
- A second big issue is that our Club Budget has taken a 25% hit with Covid19 which we are unlikely to catch up on. For the last couple of years ROCL has budgeted to split our donations three ways. Equal shares to International Programs, Rotary Programs and Local Community Programs. This year our plan was \$7K for each but we have revised that down to \$5K each and adjusted our outgoings accordingly. We also have enough reserves for \$3K each next year which is enough for a worst case scenario where we only cover our ongoing commitments. Hopefully the situation will have normalised enough in the coming year for us to do some

additional fundraising and we can return to close to our original budget of \$7K each.

- The current financial situation is that we have \$20K in the Bank of Us including the Asset Refurbishment Fund and other reserves. The only area of concern is that the Club Administration account is almost empty after three months of transactions with no meetings for income. This will need to be addressed early in the next Rotary Year.
- The next item is just a good news item to let you all know that our Operations Team have Tommy and our Truck in tip top condition to return to work as soon as there is a need. Thanks Peter M, Neville, David, (Young) Ted and John C.
- Another good news item is that we are very close to formally launching our Satellite Club, Clarence Sunrise. They are back to face to face meetings and have seven inducted members (they need eight) and there are two prospective members in sight. This may happen as soon as next month.
- With the return of Ted Kulinski this month, our membership will have increased by 15 members over the last six months and our average age has decreased by 10 years. We are now probably the youngest Club in District 9830 so I hope that makes you all feel younger.
- Our “Not the Change Over Dinner” originally scheduled for June, will be held on 15th July at the Bowls Club. Keep this date in your diary. Apart from changing the outgoing President to the new President (both me), we can’t really make any definitive arrangements at this stage because things are still in a state of flux. We will however do our best to arrange something interesting for the night.
- Our Project at Risdon Vale School continues to progress, if slowly. We are waiting on the delivery of the Glass House so that we can have a working bee to set it up which should happen within the next month.
- Clarence Sunrise have completed their push-up challenge for Headspace and are now planning to help the wine industry in the Coal Valley to recover from the lockdown. Apart from their own personal consumption they are inviting Rotarians and Friends of Rotary to buy some wine from Parallax Organic Vineyard. 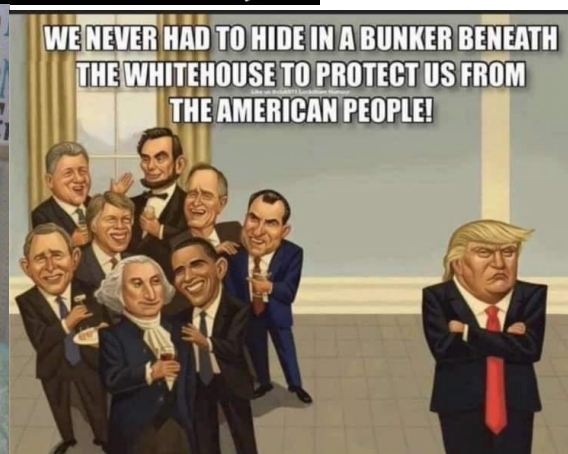
