Last Meeting Nigel Grey - Anzac Day Commemorative Talk



Rotarian Nigel related a fascinating tale about a bit of World War 1 history involving the German, Hellmuth von Mucke.

Mücke was the Executive Officer on the German Light Cruiser SMS Emden of the Imperial German Navy during her successful career as a commerce raider in the autumn of 1914.

The Emden intercepted dozens of merchant ships as well as British, French, and Russian military vessels in the Pacific Ocean and Indian Ocean over 4 months, but finally, on 9 November 1914, she encountered and was severely damaged by the larger Australian light cruiser, HMAS Sydney.

The Emden's captain, dispatched Mücke to lead a 53-man landing party onto nearby Direction Island, one of the Cocos (Keeling) Islands, to destroy the wireless station and the shore facilities of the important intercontinental communications cable.

Mücke and his landing party witnessed the final destruction of the Emden from just 17 miles away and realized they had no hope of relief. They seized a derelict, 97-ton, three-masted schooner, the Ayesha, quickly made her seaworthy and escaped.

Over the next 6 months, Mücke led his small command on one of the longest escapes recorded – over 11,000 km by sea and land back to Germany – losing only one man to disease and three to enemy action, a remarkable achievement for the times.






Did You Know?
