Update from our President

District Assembly was held on 22nd May in Deloraine. The District Budget for 2021-22 was set so all our Club Board needs now is the July exchange rate for US\$ so that they can set the annual membership fee for our Club. It is likely to be at least \$20 more than last year.

There were two main themes at the District Assembly. The first was a focus on membership and Mark Huddleston, the guest speaker gave a detailed outline of the importance of changing how clubs organise their meetings, look after their existing members, find projects that members can get enthusiastic about, be inclusive when recruiting new members and above all have fun together. The second part of his talk was about the need to start new Rotary Clubs that were different in some way to the existing clubs around them. The Rotary Club of Lindisfarne was mentioned as a good example of what was being suggested at least half a dozen times, but so were West Burnie, Howrah, North Hobart and Sandy Bay, who are all doing well this year.

The second theme was Incoming District Governor Heather Chong's call to arms for clubs in District 9830 to find some sort of project for 2021-22 that will benefit the homeless in Tasmania. Our Satellite Club, Clarence Sunrise has hit the ground running and has already started collecting food hampers to help City Mission feed people over winter. The challenge is just in time for incoming President Stephen Bray to take on.

Last Friday RCOL handed over a new ride on mower, a whipper snipper and consumables including safety equipment, to the Risdon Vale Neighbourhood Centre. This was made possible via a Commonwealth Government Stronger Communities Grant, made available by Julie Collins office. A big thankyou to Chris Woodward and Ted Kulinski who identified the need with the Neighbourhood Centre, applied for the Grant and purchased the equipment. Ted & Chris were there on the day for the handover with Julie Collins and were thanked by everyone involved.

Don't forget our social event at the end of this month. Put 30th June in your diary now. More details this Wednesday.

The District Changeover Lunch will be at noon in Campbell Town on Sunday 27th June. If any of our new members would like to attend they would be very welcome. It would be a good way to meet Rotarians from other Clubs and should be a good day. Talk to me on Wednesday if you are interested.






