Last Meeting Club Planning + Georgina Perri – RYLA Attendee



Malcolm Portwin explained that planning enables the club to determine how we will operate over the next 3-5 years, by clarifying what we stand for and to plan for long term goals. There are many benefits to the process including, a continuity of our projects and decision making, our relevance in the community we support, and succession planning. Malcolm will run a 2-hour session with the club to develop ideas and seek our input. He will then go away, collate the data and send this back to the Club. Malcolm recommends the Club have a champion to monitor actions and outcomes – not necessarily a Board Member, but someone with an interest in the Club's new plan.



Georgina Perri from Richmond was sponsored by the RCOL to participate in the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) and told us about her recent experience over five days at Camp Clayton. Georgina said participating in RYLA had drastically changed her outlook on life. A presentation by Robyn Moore (known as the voice of Blinky Bill), where she talked about how we can all 'choose who you want to be' resonated strongly. Since participating in RYLA, Georgina has re-evaluated her career and has made a change to be better aligned with her new perspective. She explained how her time on the program took her out of her comfort zone, but it also helped her learn she could do more than she thought.

Georgina had a number of key takeaways from the camp, including:

- Enhanced communication and listening skills
- Better understanding of how to relate to others & support people in different ways
- How to trust the process and conquer her fears
