PRESIDENT'S REPORT AGM 2022

This report covers the period since the last AGM

The first half of this year presented real time challenge with Covid spreading through the state and disrupting life. Rotary events were not immune with me and a few other members and partners catching it through district and fellowship events. For our Club we have learnt to live with Covid and our regular meetings have continued with only a few hiccups on the way. It has been understandable that some of our members have distanced themselves from our meetings due to health concerns.

After rapid growth a few years back, we had a decline in membership both here and with Clarence Sunrise. This has been due various reasons including health, other opportunities, life work pressures travel or simply feel they are not a good fit for our Club. Our membership currently stands at 41 down by 3 from last financial year.

Despite I thanks the high rate of club member participation in the various volunteer and fundraising events the Club has been involved in during the year, especially in the two very busy months of October and November.

I also acknowledge the health challenges of two of our members Margot and Peter O'Hearn. It is great to see both of you here tonight.

The club has notable successes during the year. Particularly the Charity Dinner & Auction and our involvement in the taste style event in the Coal Valley. Noted that this event has been delayed to 2024 but at least this is up and running.

The Charity Dinner and Auction was a boost to our fund raising and Hobart City Mission and Friends of Nepal well benefit well from this. Also, I should mention we have done well out of Bunnings and various other BBQ's and the Train bookings have been strong in recent months. Not to forget how successful the new trash and treasure event at the Motor Yacht Club was.

The Club provided volunteer support to Hobart City Missions successful Sleep Rough event, which was well received by the organisers and we continue to support the Risdon Vale Community Centre.

I also always like to acknowledge that there are several members in the club who do a mountain of volunteer work quietly in the background and seek no accolades.

Our Club has always been supportive of Youth and we had volunteers at RYDA, we sponsored

Georgina Perri to the RYLA Camp in May, sponsored two students, Cooper Daniels and Jessica Mudge from Rose Bay HS to attend in the Santos Science Experience in December last year and we provide School Awards to local primary schools, high schools and Rosny College

Operations used the Covid period to get our equipment in good order as well as taking on the organisation of bookings for Tommy and BBQ's at a rate making up for the lack of opportunities in recent years.

For a medium size Club we punch above our weight for District representation and contributions with 5 Club members involved. I acknowledge past President Mike Patten taking on the District Governors role and I wish him well for his new role in 2023.

An important part of the Club is our twice monthly meetings and social events. You would all agree that the guest speakers we had have been of high standard with a diversity in topics. Our meetings are structured but at the same time have been simplified and hopefully comes across as a friendly and informal. Our newsletters have always been of a high standard and has jumped to another level with our new editor taking over recently.

The Club has met its goals for 2021/2022 and was awarded a citation for this. I was proud to provide to present a Paul Harris Fellow to Margaret Congram to add to the many worthy recipients the Club has.

The Board met 12 times, counting next weeks meeting, and did achieve many things while enjoying my meagre wine collection.

Overall the last twelve months have been a strong year for the Club.

For my remaining six months I would like to finalise the Club planning process that was recently started and look at more volunteering opportunities for the Club.

2023 will be quite busy with along with our normal activities there will be our 50th year to celebrate, the District Expo, the International Conference in Melbourne and a trip to Nepal.

Thank you for your support over the last twelve months and advance thanks for my final six months as President.




