• Born and raised in Melbourne suburb of Essendon. This had its difficulties as my family and I were and remain true Western Bulldog supporters.



• It was necessary to move the family to hobart in order to take up the position fo Tas State Manager for an Investment Funds Management Co.

• Pleasingly, from a standing start in three years our Team lifted the Tasmanian operations to No.1 in 'effectiveness and efficiency'. Sadly, the company was purchased by Colonial First State and I became an independent Financial Planner.

• In 1987/88 longtime Lindisfarne Rotarian BILL ALLINGHAM invited me to consider joining the club. At the time Club meetings were at the Beltana Hotel, with a membership of some 46 drawn from a wide range of vocations.

• A key mthod of fundraising was sheep manure bagging and an early involvement for me was a full weekend of bagging at Oatlands.



Whilst this was great fellowship experience now with other fund raising options such as Tommy Choo Choo we fortunately do not need to be so physical. • Over my 35 years in Rotray, I have held most positions including President. During that year we had a very successful function involving all Eastern Shore Clubs. Lindisfarne was the Host Club and it was held at the Motor Yatch Club.

#### **RYDA RUN DOWN**

Over the past three weeks Grade 10 pupils from all over southern Tasmania together with some Grade 11 and 12 students Claremont College students have been involved with the RYDA (Rotary Youth Driver Awareness) program which, except for the Huonville day, was conducted this year for the first time at Claremont College.

This statewide program has been organised by Rotary Tasmania for many years. Other sessions are held at Symmons Plains near Launceston and at Camp Clayton in Ulverstone.

The state government has again allocated \$100 000 this year to the program. Graduates of the program, who present a completed RYDA booklet endorsed by a teacher to the relevant authority, will have their 80 hour logged driving practice requirement reduced by 5 hours.

During the day, students attend 6 half hour sessions which are conducted by Tasmania Police, a crash survivor (note; not accident) and 4 sessions facilitated by Rotarians.

The Rotarians' sessions include speeding and stopping. Students learn about tyre wear, ABS brakes and observe how far it takes to bring a car to a stop. Believe me; 40 kilometres per hour is fast.

Another session involves *Remembering Genevieve*. Genevieve is real. She died in a car crash some 15 years ago. Her parents and friends are interviewed and the crash is examined.

The *I* in Drive urges students to take responsibility for their own safety. Passengers must protect themselves. But how?

#### And Mind Matters.

What is going on in the driver's head when a car is being driven? What does the driver see? What should the driver be aware of?

During the program Rotarians act as facilitators and guides taking class groups from one activity to another. I facilitated many of the *I in Drive* sessions. Peter Fitzgerald, Nigel Grey, Richard Horswill, Allan Marshall and Mike Patten were guides.

Keep an eye out for it in 2024. It is a full and satisfying day where you can learn great deal about road safety yourself.

Currency Café

Just a follow up on the medical emeregency we had in the cafe on Sunday.

A lady had a major heart problem, which resulted in her collapsing and I believe there was no pulse detected.

A family member immediately rang 000.

One of our other customers started CPR while Pam grabbed the defibrillator located on the Currency premises and followed the defib prompts 3 times. Pam then relieved the lady doing CPR until the ambulance crew arrived. Estimated time about 8mins.

The lady did have a pulse by the time the ambulance arrived.

The family of the lady has been in touch. She was operated on that night and we have been told she is doing well and looking foward to finishing brunch when she is up to it.

#### A couple of things.

The defibrillator which was installed only a couple of months ago saved this ladies life, so thank you to Lindisfarne Rotary, Tas Ambulance, Dean Young MP for their help installing.

Our staff at Currency did a fantastic job in a very stressful and traumatic event .

The lady who helped Pam you are a hero, come in whenever you like for a chat.

Steven who was at the cafe for lunch after the event and noticed that the staff where a liitle quiet and suggested a debrief which he stayed back and facilitated that was invaluable thank you.

And finally to my wife Pamela there are no words really your response in that situation was cool, calm and collected your actions to get the defib installed firstly then to actually have to save a persons life with it. Amazing.

If you were at Currency on Sunday during the Emergency and you feel a bit uneasy and want a quick chat,please have no hesitation.


It's arrived!


